This document contains the **Agenda Topic Summaries** of the background information for all of the items to be considered by the thirteen Conference committees of the 72nd General Service Conference (GSC). The topics will be discussed by their respective committees, and the committees *may* or *may not* send recommendations to the whole Conference for consideration and vote.

The **purpose** of these summaries is so that they may be used as a tool by General Service Representatives (GSRs) to provide their group with pertinent information to facilitate an informed group conscience and then to convey that group conscience to the CNCA 06 Delegate. In many cases, the summaries serve as an appetizer and those GSRs and groups with an interest in more information can obtain the complete background by way of a password-protected link on our Area website. Your District Committee Member Chair (DCMC) or DCM can provide you with the password. Please remember to **treat the background as A.A. Confidential**, and do not share it in any public forum or with non A.A. members.

**Please pay special attention in these summaries to the section at the end of each topic: “What does the Delegate need to know?”** Not all topics make for fruitful discussion at group level, and this is intended to help you narrow that down. Many of the agenda topics are only for that particular committee (such as reviewing a draft or progress report on the development of a piece of literature) and do not require a group conscience, but still may be of great interest to read and share. Other topics appear every year, such as reviewing workbooks and kits used by Public Information, Corrections, etc. Local committees may wish to share their experience. These summaries may also be used by other members of our Fellowship to communicate good information about the agenda topics and, where appropriate, to convey opinions to the Delegate. Any questions in this section are intended to be a guide, not a limit, for your sharing sessions. Feel free to interpret them broadly.

Your Delegate this year serves on the **Trustees Committee**. Please bear in mind that I will have the opportunity to discuss the agenda topics in that section in depth during my committee meetings at the Conference and your input on those items would be especially helpful.

**What is new in 2022** is that we are in the first year of the three-year trial of the Equitable Distribution of Workload (EDW) process. If you want to know more about the EDW, there is a detailed report on this under Policy/Admissions. The key thing to note here is that there are Literature items sprinkled throughout the Conference committees to allow for more members of the Conference to share in the work. So be sure to look through all the agenda topics to see if there are any of interest to your group or committee.

Agenda Topic	<b>Review suggestions for the theme of the 2023 General Service Conference.</b>
Historical Context; Why is it on the Agenda?	The theme of the Conference and the presentation topics revolve around the basic principles of A.A.; these suggestions can provoke a stimulating discussion at Area and District meetings as well. Regions, areas, and districts often incorporate the theme of the Conference in discussions, giving members of A.A. an opportunity to participate and be more informed about A.A. The background includes a list of 23 suggestions for the theme of next year's Conference. The background also has a list with the themes of every Conference between 1951 and 2022. The Agenda committee will review and discuss all the ideas submitted and present a recommendation to the full Conference for approval.

The Agenda committee will review and discuss all the ideas submitted and present a recommendation to the full Conference for approval.

Agenda Topic	<b>Review the General Service Conference Evaluation Form, distribution process and 2021 Evaluation Summary.</b>
Historical Context; Why is it on the Agenda?	The committee reviewed the draft version of the 72 <sup>nd</sup> General Service Conference evaluation form and discussed the suggestion to include a question on the form related to the pilot of the Equitable Distribution of Workload. The committee agreed to implement the updates to the evaluation form for the 2022 General Service Conference. The background includes a copy of this year's evaluation form. A summary of results from the 2021 evaluation form is also in the background. The feedback is generally positive about the 2021 Conference, the second Conference held virtually in A.A. history. There were

	concerns about the timeliness of the Conference Manuals arriving to attendees in advance of the Conference and some questions about the value of having presentations in the midst of an already-quiet-busy Conference agenda. Digital distribution of Conference materials was generally well-received, although some members still preferred hard copies.

Conference Committee: **Agenda — Item E**

Agenda Topic	<b>Discuss progress report of Conference improvement.</b>
Historical Context; Why is it on the Agenda?	At the August 2021 board meeting the committee formed a subcommittee on Conference improvement, with part of its scope to discuss a proposed agenda item to “alternate the G.S.C. between virtual and face-to-face formats.” The background contains a bulleted list of the subcommittee’s further scope that it was tasked to make progress reports and recommendations on, and excerpts from the progress reports in October 2021 and January 2022. The final subcommittee meeting was January 4, 2022, and the draft for the 2022 Conference Week Schedule was reviewed and accepted.
What does the Delegate need to know?	We will not hear group consciences on this item at the Assembly, but you can share them with the Delegate via email, through a web form on the Area website, or by phone.

Conference Committee: **Cooperation with the Professional Community — Item A**

Agenda Topic	<b>Review progress report on A.A.W.S. LinkedIn page.</b>
Historical Context; Why is it on the Agenda?	<p>In 2017, the Conference C.P.C. committee began discussing the potential development of a LinkedIn page for Cooperation with the Professional Community committees and requested that the trustees write a report exploring all aspects of this social media tool, whether it was feasible within the Traditions, and develop a potential implementation plan. A report from the Trustees was presented in 2018, at which point the Conference C.P.C. committee recommended the development of an A.A.W.S. page on LinkedIn that could help professionals find information about A.A., broaden the reach of the <i>About A.A.</i> newsletter for professionals, and potentially deepen the pool of Class A Trustee candidates.</p> <p>The 2019 C.P.C. committee reinforced the 2018 request, asking for a disclaimer that “promoted” content on the LinkedIn page was not affiliated with A.A., adding links and content referencing how A.A. cooperated with professionals, and requesting an annual report tracking how the LinkedIn page was used. In 2021, the committee reinforced this request, resulting in the progress report in the background now. This progress report notes that in the last quarter of 2021, A.A.’s LinkedIn page had 1600 followers and 1506 page views from 578 unique visitors from across multiple industries. Engagement with the content on the page ranged from 8 to 10 percent.</p> <p>Current priorities for the LinkedIn page include posting a range of content directed to professionals (including newsletters, videos directed to professionals, and employment opportunities) and expanding the use and visibility of A.A. on LinkedIn.</p>
What does the Delegate need to know?	We will not hear group consciences on this item at the Assembly, but you can share them with the Delegate via email, through a web form on the Area website, or by phone.

**Conference Committee: Cooperation with the Professional Community — Item B**

Agenda Topic	<b>Review suggested revisions for the draft pamphlet “A.A. in Your Community.”</b>
Historical Context; Why is it on the Agenda?	In 2020, the Conference C.P.C. committee requested possible updates to the pamphlet “A.A. in Your Community” that focused on currency and inclusion of modern professionals, and to also create samples that communicate the content of the pamphlet visually. Suggested edits to the text of the pamphlet are included in the background.
What does the Delegate need to know?	We will not hear group consciences on this item at the Assembly, but you can share them with the Delegate via email, through a web form on the Area website, or by phone.

**Conference Committee: Cooperation with the Professional Community — Item C**

Agenda Topic	<b>Review progress report on the development of outward facing pamphlets for the mental health professionals.</b>
Historical Context; Why is it on the Agenda?	In 2021, the Conference C.P.C. committee recommended the development of a pamphlet directed to mental health professionals. The Trustees met and determined that to help develop this pamphlet, they would first assemble a focus group of Class A (non-alcoholic) trustees and other mental health professionals that are members of the fellowship to find out what they need when addressing the suffering alcoholic.  The focus group met and discussed barriers to referring or providing information to clients about A.A. The entire focus group report is in the background. Barriers included confusion about spirituality vs. religion, that professionals don’t know how to “refer” people to A.A. since A.A. has no intake process, confusion about anonymity, confusion about A.A.’s policy on medication (there is none), understanding who is an alcoholic, knowing the types of meetings that exist, confusion about A.A.’s singleness of purpose, and sometimes non-existent relationships with local A.A. resources. The focus group hoped that A.A. could clearly communicate that recovery is an evidence-based service, that it is accessible, and that it is inclusive.
What does the Delegate need to know?	What does your group or committee hope is included in a pamphlet directed to mental health professionals? What information do you think can help mental health professionals effectively address suffering alcoholics?

**Conference Committee: Cooperation with the Professional Community — Item D**

Agenda Topic	<b>Consider creating a new pamphlet designed to help C.P.C. committees reach as many doctors as possible.</b>
Historical Context; Why is it on the Agenda?	A C.P.C. committee in Boise, Idaho is asking for the development of a pamphlet to help C.P.C. committees reach doctors. The committee notes the current “A.A. as a Resource for the Healthcare Professional” pamphlet is quite involved, and a C.P.C. contact card may be too impersonal to communicate with doctors. The committee also observes local doctors are not engaged with A.A., and that many doctors do not know they are treating alcoholics. The background information also includes a sample page of a potential pamphlet.
What does the Delegate need to know?	Does your group or committee think a pamphlet specifically targeting doctors is necessary? Why or why not?

**Conference Committee: Cooperation with the Professional Community — Item E**

Agenda Topic	<b>Review contents of C.P.C. Kit and Workbook.</b>
Historical Context; Why is it on the Agenda?	Workbooks for Archives, C.P.C., Corrections, Public Information, Treatment and Accessibilities are reviewed by the appropriate Conference committees during each General Service Conference. In 2021, the Conference C.P.C. committee asked for shared

	<p>experience on creative ways to carry the A.A. message to professionals (including, but not limited to) during the COVID-19 pandemic. Sharing from the fellowship is included in the background, and it could be added to the Kit and Workbook. There are also two suggested revisions to the current <i>Sample guide letter to Military chaplains</i>, an example of a letter to a military chaplain, and a proposal to remove the <i>Sample guide letter to professionals who work with military veterans</i> from the C.P.C. Workbook because it might be missing the mark to the targeted audience and much of what the letter suggests is better-stated in other parts of the Workbook.</p> <p>The current C.P.C. What does the Delegate need to know?	We will not hear group consciences on this item at the Assembly; if your group has suggestions regarding materials that should be added or deleted, please share them with the Delegate or Alternate Delegate via email, through a web form on the Area website, or by phone.

### Conference Committee: **Corrections — Item A**

Agenda Topic	<b>Review Corrections Kit and Workbook.</b>
Historical Context; Why is it on the Agenda?	<p>Every year, the Corrections committee at the Conference reviews the Corrections Kit and Workbook. Outdated information may be updated or removed by GSO staff members, who report those changes to the trustees. There were two meetings with the trustees' committee on Corrections scheduled due to the many revisions that were suggested by the National Corrections Committee. The suggested revisions are still being reviewed by the Corrections committee and are not available in the background. Because of the current supply chain challenges, including paper shortages, it is anticipated that the revised kit and workbook will be available in digital format prior to the print versions.</p> <p>The current Kit and Workbook are available online:  <a href="http://www.aa.org/contents-corrections-committee-kit-list">www.aa.org/contents-corrections-committee-kit-list</a></p>
What does the Delegate need to know?	Does your group or committee have any suggestions regarding materials that should be added (or removed) from the Corrections Kit and Workbook?

### Conference Committee: **Corrections — Item B**

Agenda Topic	<b>Reconsider use of the term “person in custody” in A.A. literature.</b>
Historical Context; Why is it on the Agenda?	<p>This proposal comes from a District in Area 79 (BC/Yukon) and the GSR of a Medium Security Institutional Group in Canada. They are asking the 2022 Conference to reconsider the 2021 Conference decision to change the language in our A.A. literature from “Inmate” and “Convict” to “Person in Custody.” The submitter says that “Person in Custody” is neither recognized nor used in Canada’s Judicial system. Multiple correctional A.A. groups felt using the term already in use, “Inside A.A. Members” was more respectful and encourages inclusiveness. They also felt that the terminology of inmate or convicts is appropriate when literature is directed to professionals. There are suggestions for different terminology from Correction Groups in the background, along with copies of A.A. Prerelease Contact Information service pieces F-162 and F-163.</p>
What does the Delegate need to know?	Does your group feel that the term “person in custody” should be reconsidered? Why or why not?

Conference Committee: **Corrections — Item C**

Agenda Topic	<b>Consider requests to limit changes to the book <i>Alcoholics Anonymous</i>.</b>
Historical Context; Why is it on the Agenda?	<p>The 71st General Service Conference passed two advisory actions to develop a Fifth Edition of the Big Book. First, that a Fifth Edition of the Big Book, <i>Alcoholics Anonymous</i>, be developed, including an update of stories to better reflect current membership, keeping in mind the 1995 Advisory Action that “The first 164 pages of the Big Book, <i>Alcoholics Anonymous</i>, the Preface, the Forewords, ‘The Doctor’s Opinion,’ ‘Doctor Bob’s Nightmare’ and the Appendices remain as is.” Second, that “Pending its development, the draft Fifth Edition of the Big Book would include a new foreword, an updated preface, and updates to expand on existing ideas in Appendices III and V.”</p> <p>There are two requests in the background that were combined into this single item. The first one cites the second advisory action noted above and expresses the sentiment that the protection of Bill’s writings from the 1995 Advisory Action was taken away by the actions of the 71st Conference. They also note that updates to Appendices III and V can be via additional information immediately following the existing text of the respective appendix.</p> <p>The second submission included in this item also asks that no changes be made to the Big Book except for updating stories. The reasoning behind their proposal is that they feel that outside issues are being brought into A.A. and into A.A. literature. They quote Tradition 10 and the Preamble as well as our co-founder Bill Wilson. There is a comparison to the Washingtonian Movement and how outside issues destroyed that movement and how they feel Alcoholics Anonymous is heading in that direction. The submitter also expressed concerns on “cancelling pronouns” being the start of changes throughout the literature with of a possible progression of removing “musts” to eventually removing God.</p>
What does the Delegate need to know?	Does your group feel there is a need to limit changes to the book <i>Alcoholics Anonymous</i> ? Why or why not?

Conference Committee: **Corrections — Item D**

Agenda Topic	<b>Discuss request to make A.A. literature changes slowly and with A.A.’s primary purpose in mind.</b>
Historical Context; Why is it on the Agenda?	This submission comes from a long-time member who feels that “considering making any changes to the Big Book and any literature is a mistake while the world is challenged by distance due to the Covid-19 pandemic.” He asks us to keep the lesson of the Washingtonians in mind when making changes, that our message has worked for 86 years, and that our primary purpose should remain clear.
What does the Delegate need to know?	Does your group feel that changes to our A.A. literature are done at a pace that keeps our primary purpose in mind? Why or why not?

Conference Committee: **Finance— Item A**

Agenda Topic	<b>Review Self-Support Packet.</b>
Historical Context; Why is it on the Agenda?	The self-support packet is reviewed annually by the Conference Committee on Finance. It consists of a number of pamphlets, the self-support card, A.A. Guidelines on Finance and the Birthday Envelope. The memo in the background also asks that the Conference Committee review the materials with an eye toward inconsistent language regarding making contributions to G.S.O. (General Service Office) when they should be made to G.S.B. (General Service Board).
What does the Delegate need to know?	We will not hear group consciences on this item at the Assembly, but you can share them with the Delegate via email, through a web form on the Area website, or by phone. Does

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Conference Committee: **Finance — Item B**

Agenda Topic	<b>Consider request to add a historical disclaimer to the front of the book <i>Twelve Steps and Twelve Traditions</i>.</b>
Historical Context; Why is it on the Agenda?	<p>This proposal from Texas included a number of letters from groups and districts in support and suggests that rather than making changes to the text, something like the following could be added as a disclaimer: “While the language in this text may seem dated, please remember that Bill W. wrote in the language and custom of his times. Bill was very tolerant of different individuals and members. All alcoholics, were and are now welcomed cordially into A.A. Were Bill to write this book today, it may be worded differently in some places. Society may change, but the basic spiritual principles of Alcoholics Anonymous are classic and eternal. We hope that this book continues to broaden and deepen the understanding of the Twelve Steps as written in the book Alcoholics Anonymous.”</p> <p>G.S.O. received many other requests to reverse or rescind one or more of the changes approved at last year’s General Service Conference, and several requests to preserve, unaltered, the text of the book <i>Twelve Steps and Twelve Traditions</i> as originally published. These requests are excerpted in the background and fall generally into the following categories: the sentiment that no changes should be made to Bill’s writing, concerns that one change could lead to a “slippery slope” of endless future changes, that the COVID pandemic (or other issues) didn’t allow for a fully informed group conscience, and that the changes are the result of outside issues and therefore not in keeping with Tradition 10.</p>
What does the Delegate need to know?	What does your group think about the idea of adding a historical disclaimer at the beginning of the book <i>Twelve Steps and Twelve Traditions</i> ?

Conference Committee: **Finance — Item C**

Agenda Topic	<b>Consider request that all proposed changes to the book <i>Twelve Steps and Twelve Traditions</i> be handled in footnotes.</b>
Historical Context; Why is it on the Agenda?	In response to the changes made at last year’s Conference, this proposal from a District seeks to maintain the integrity and historical accuracy of the text by handling all changes in footnotes rather than in a revision of the actual text.
What does the Delegate need to know?	Does your group feel that changes to <i>Twelve Steps and Twelve Traditions</i> should be handled in footnotes or by changing the body of work itself? Why?

Conference Committee: **Grapevine and La Viña — Item A**

Agenda Topic	<b>Review progress report on AA Grapevine Workbook revisions.</b>
Historical Context; Why is it on the Agenda?	The Grapevine Workbook is available via <a href="http://aagrapevine.org">aagrapevine.org</a> and is used primarily by Grapevine Representatives and Committees. This is an annually standing agenda item for the Grapevine committee. The background notes that the committee last year asked for additional information to be included in the workbook on ways to use the AA Grapevine as a Twelfth Step tool, the availability of books, pricing, ways Canadian members can more easily participate, and new multimedia platforms. AA Grapevine management has contracted a freelancer to help rewrite and redesign the workbook to add graphics and expand on ways to use the magazine as a recovery tool.
What does the Delegate need to know?	We will not hear group consciences on this item at the Assembly, but you can share them with the Delegate via email, through a web form on the Area website, or by phone.

**Conference Committee: Grapevine and La Viña — Item B**

Agenda Topic	<b>Review progress report on Grapevine and La Viña Instagram accounts</b>
Historical Context; Why is it on the Agenda?	<p>In 2021, the Grapevine committee recommended that the A.A. Grapevine Board launch an Instagram account, and they requested that a report on that account be brought back to the Conference this year. Instagram is an online mobile photo-sharing site that allows its users to share pictures and videos either publicly or privately (as well as through a variety of other social networking platforms). It is visual in nature, allowing images to be displayed with or without short descriptions.</p> <p>The progress report (included in the background) reports that the Instagram accounts for Grapevine and La Viña launched on July 7, 2021, posting a Daily Quote each morning and additional posts each week (including new magazine issue releases, new book accounts, and inspiration from both AA pioneers and today’s members). There are numerous examples of posts in the background. More than 130,000 people were reached by the Grapevine posts; the account has 5965 followers (an increase of 8.21 percent in the past 90 days). The large majority of followers are from the United States (with a handful of followers from other English-speaking countries), approximately 40 percent of followers are under age 45, and more than half of followers are female. Another 15,000 people were reached by the La Viña posts; the account has 658 followers (an increase of 6.82 percent in the past 90 days). While the majority of followers are from the United States and Mexico, a large number of followers come from Spanish-speaking countries in Central America, South America, and Europe. Nearly 45 percent of followers are under age 45, and while the majority of followers are male, about 35 percent of followers are female.</p>
What does the Delegate need to know?	We will not hear group consciences on this item at the Assembly, but you can share them with the Delegate via email, through a web form on the Area website, or by phone.

**Conference Committee: Grapevine and La Viña — Item C**

Agenda Topic	<b>Consider the list of suggested Grapevine book topics for 2023 and later.</b>
Historical Context; Why is it on the Agenda?	<p>At every Conference, the Grapevine Committee reviews a list of proposed book topics. The proposed books for 2023 (and later) are:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>1. Best of Dear Grapevine (working title) - Previously published stories from the pages of Grapevine by A.A. members which were printed in the magazine’s letters section.</li> <li>2. Book for Newcomers (working title) - Previously published stories by A.A. members sharing helpful tools and suggestions during their first year in sobriety.</li> <li>3. Best of La Viña II (working title) (La Viña book) - Spanish-speaking A.A. members share their experience, strength and hope, from the pages of La Viña</li> <li>4. Prayer &amp; Meditation (working title) (La Viña book) - Previously published stories by Spanish-speaking A.A. members sharing about the many ways they practice Step Eleven (possibly including some translated stories from the Grapevine version).</li> </ol> <p>The background also includes a list of previously-approved book ideas that could be produced.</p>
What does the Delegate need to know?	What do the members of your group think about these topics for Grapevine/La Viña books? Are there other topics they would like to see addressed?

Conference Committee: **Grapevine and La Viña — Item D**

Agenda Topic	<b>Discuss the wide-ranging impact the Preamble change has had on our A.A. Fellowship.</b>
Historical Context; Why is it on the Agenda?	<p>In 2021, as the result of a floor action at the General Service Conference, the A.A. Preamble published in the Grapevine was revised, with the word “people” replacing “men and women.”</p> <p>A letter from the Grapevine Board Chair included in the background notes that, almost immediately following last year’s Conference, the Grapevine Board began receiving considerable feedback (some favorable, some unfavorable, and some simply asking for additional information) regarding the Preamble revision. While some people said that the A.A. unity was enhanced by the welcoming language, others said unity was disrupted by the change. Some members expressed concern that Grapevine’s editorial independence was negatively impacted; however, it was the Board, Publisher, and Editors who proposed this change and forwarded the change for discussion as an agenda item to the General Service Conference. Some people noted that each group is autonomous – and that their groups had changed the Preamble prior to the official change, while others said their groups would continue using “men and women.” Some people suggested the language change was an outside issue, while others said it was an inside issue supported by Tradition 3 (welcoming, inclusive, etc.). The Grapevine Board Chair concludes that more discussion is required so that we can move forward as a Fellowship.</p> <p>A timeline of how the Preamble change occurred is also included in the background.</p>
What does the Delegate need to know?	How well has your group received the new A.A. Preamble? Do you have any examples of how the change has helped or hindered unity in the Fellowship? Do you have any examples of how it has helped or hindered newcomers getting sober in A.A.?

Historical Context; Why is it on the Agenda?	The matrix is designed as a tool for the trustees’ and Conference Literature committees, containing pertinent information regarding distribution to inform periodic review. It was also noted that consideration is underway for the matrix and workflow information to be included in the background for review and approval of pamphlet updates per the A.A.W.S. print policy (see Item O).

History regarding the development of the current Third Edition is in the background, along with requests for revisions related to translation “errors and omissions” sent in by members over the years. The progress report includes information on the working group timeline and call for stories, with plans for presentations and story writing workshops at numerous A.A. events. A call for stories will come soon.</p> <p>The seven members on this working group have been chosen for their experience as native Spanish-speaking members of the Fellowship. Their heritage includes Mexico, Central and South America, Spain, and the Caribbean and they are all very active in service at different levels. The working group will collect stories from the broad diversity of Hispanic A.A. members in the U.S./Canada structure only, noting that countries outside the U.S./Canada structure can obtain licenses from A.A.W.S. that would allow original stories from their respective countries to be included in Big Book editions they publish themselves. The working group is mindful of translation concerns. The Publishing department will work with a professional translator to provide drafts, which the members of the working group will then review in sections to ensure that the text encompasses the diversity of the Spanish-speaking population. They will use the list of corrections and suggestions received as a reference when they review the drafts from Publishing, and they are taking notes on what they hear from the Fellowship.</p>

Agenda Topic	<b>Review progress report regarding the translation of the book <i>Alcoholics Anonymous (Fourth Edition)</i> into plain and simple language.</b>
Historical Context; Why is it on the Agenda?	<p>In 2021, the Conference approved a recommendation that a draft version of the book, <i>Alcoholics Anonymous</i> (Fourth Edition), be translated into plain and simple language and be developed in a way that is accessible and relatable to as wide of an audience as possible. The detailed progress report from the Tools to Access the Big Book (TABB) subcommittee is available in the background. TABB reviewed all the feedback from the Fellowship on the video that was made available last year by a previous subcommittee (RIPTAB). Some information on their review carries over into the related Item L below.</p> <p>The TABB subcommittee also reviewed a number of proposed agenda items sent in this year to stop the development of a plain language Big Book. Of note in these proposals were concerns regarding political intentions, eradication of God, and the removal of all gendered language. The TABB subcommittee affirmed in the report that the objective is to achieve a translation into plain language that meets the accessibility needs of those with a 5th grade reading level. The request to prospective translators noted specifically that “we are seeking simplification of vocabulary, syntax and style to bring it into alignment with current plain language guidelines” and that “sensitivity to A.A.-specific language will be key.” While the translator is a professional, this will be a collaborative effort. A.A. members through the TABB subcommittee, G.S.O., the trustees’ Literature Committee and ultimately the General Service Conference will guide the process.</p> <p>Also in the report is a roadmap to guide workflows and address the unique circumstances of this sort of translation, including touchpoints with the General Service Conference. Of particular note is that some unedited samples of the translated text from the Big Book are included in this report. While very preliminary in nature, the TABB subcommittee recognizes that there is “a high level of interest in the process for the plain and simple language translation, and that there are those with concerns regarding the intent of this project. It is hoped that this early transparency, and of sharing materials that have yet to even be edited, will serve to provide the Conference Committee on Literature the opportunity to see exactly where this project is at this point in time and offer any early feedback that they may have.”</p>
What does the Delegate need to know? Historical Context; Why is it on the Agenda?	<p>In 2021, the Conference Literature committee requested that the trustees’ Literature committee consider the development of workbooks to help study the program of <i>Alcoholics Anonymous</i>, as reflected in the most current edition of the book, <i>Alcoholics Anonymous</i>, and that a feasibility report be brought back to the 2022 Conference Committee on Literature. This year the trustees’ Literature committee also received proposed agenda items to consider creating an individualized workbook to accompany the Big Book, and the development of a contemporary and comprehensive new workbook to study the Twelve Steps, Traditions and Concepts. A detailed progress report from the Tools to Access the Big Book (TABB) subcommittee is available in the background,</p>

	<p>along with the report from a previous subcommittee (RIPTAB). There is some overlap in the report from the related Item K above.</p> <p>In January 2022, the trustees' Literature Committee discussed the work done by the TABB subcommittee regarding requests to develop study guide workbooks for A.A. The committee agreed on requesting feedback from the Fellowship on the following options:</p> <p>Option 1 – Take no action, as suggested by the 1985 advisory action which reaffirmed previous Conference actions that there was no need for a Step study guide.</p> <p>Option 2 – Turn to the Grapevine and leverage its ample archive of articles on practicing the Steps to show variation in approach and style. Future Grapevine podcasts could serve a supplemental role and help enrich this effort.</p> <p>Option 3 – Create a General Service Conference-approved study guide workbook to aid in studying the Twelve Steps. Possibly with inclusion of the Twelve Traditions and Twelve Concepts.</p> <p>Note: Options 2 and 3 to primarily be a print-based product, with the potential of supporting and/or companion material via digital, video, and/or podcast.</p>
What does the Delegate need to know?	Does your group have any feedback on the requests to develop study guide workbooks and/or the options presented above?

Agenda Topic	<b>Review progress report regarding development of a Fifth Edition of the book <i>Alcoholics Anonymous</i>.</b>
Historical Context; Why is it on the Agenda?	<p>The 71st General Service Conference passed two advisory actions to develop a Fifth Edition of the Big Book. First, that a Fifth Edition of the Big Book, <i>Alcoholics Anonymous</i>, be developed, including an update of stories to better reflect current membership, keeping in mind the 1995 Advisory Action that “The first 164 pages of the Big Book, <i>Alcoholics Anonymous</i>, the Preface, the Forewords, ‘The Doctor’s Opinion,’ ‘Doctor Bob’s Nightmare’ and the Appendices remain as is.” Second, that “pending its development, the draft Fifth Edition of the Big Book would include a new foreword, an updated preface, and updates to expand on existing ideas in Appendices III and V.”</p> <p>The detailed progress report in the background includes: a historical summary of previous editions; proposed Conference schedule of recommendations for review; a proposed monthly breakdown of the subcommittee work; proposed list of all potential recommendations/decisions related to printing a new edition with recent history of actions included; historical background notes from Fourth Edition; a talk on A.A. principles given at a Board sharing session by past trustee, David E.; a proposed call for stories for the 5th Edition; and much more. A call for stories will be coming soon.</p>
What does the Delegate need to know?	We will not hear group consciences on this item at the Assembly, but you can share them with the Delegate via email, through a web form on the Area website, or by phone.

Historical Context; Why is it on the Agenda?	<p>In 2021, three recommendations to change the book <i>Twelve Steps and Twelve Traditions</i> were passed by substantial unanimity at the 71st Conference. 1. A revision was made to page 117, replacing the phrase “mate of the opposite sex” with the word “partner.” 2. A revision was made on page 66 in the chapter “Step Six” to replace the sentence “No one wants to be angry enough to murder, lustful enough to rape, gluttonous enough to ruin his health.” The new sentence is: “No one wants to commit the deadly sins of anger, lust or gluttony.” 3. The long form of each Tradition is now included at the end of each essay for that Tradition in the book (with the complete set of Traditions still at the back of the book as before). New printings of the book in 2021-2022 have included these changes.</p> <p>The General Service Office has since received 40 requests to reverse or rescind one or more of these changes, and/or to preserve, unaltered, the text of the book <i>Twelve Steps and Twelve Traditions</i>, as originally published. The proposed agenda items, excerpts of which are sampled in the background information, fell broadly into four categories:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>1. References to previous Conference advisory actions and the sentiment that Bill’s writing should not be changed.</li> <li>2. The “slippery slope” concern, that these changes could lead to endless future changes.</li> <li>3. That the COVID pandemic, or other issues, didn’t allow for a fully informed group conscience.</li> <li>4. That the changes are the result of outside issues and therefore not in keeping with Tradition 10, or other Traditions.</li> </ol> <p>Also in the background is a History of Proposed Changes and Editorial Updates (2002 – Current) for <i>Twelve Steps and Twelve Traditions</i> prepared by the Archives department.</p>
What does the Delegate need to know?	How does your group feel about the changes that were made to the book <i>Twelve Steps and Twelve Traditions</i> ?

Agenda Topic	<b>Consider an update of the book <i>Experience, Strength and Hope</i>.</b>
Historical Context; Why is it on the Agenda?	This came from the progress report on the development of the Fifth Edition of the Big Book. In January 2022, the trustees Committee on Literature agreed to forward to the Conference Literature Committee a recommendation that all stories dropped from the Fourth Edition of the book <i>Alcoholics Anonymous</i> be added to the next printing of the book <i>Experience, Strength and Hope</i> . The current anthology contains 56 stories retired from the first three editions of the Big Book.

Agenda Topic	<b>Review G.S.O. general manager’s report regarding General Service Conference site selection.</b>
Historical Context; Why is it on the Agenda?	Last year, the committee suggested that future General Service Conference site selection reports provided by G.S.O. management include more details on specific sites considered for an overall reduction or containment of total Conference costs, suitability of sleeping rooms and meeting rooms, and an improvement in the convenience and cost of transportation to and from airports. Due to the uncertainty of the hotel market caused by the pandemic, the sites for the 74 <sup>th</sup> and 75 <sup>th</sup> General Service Conference have not yet

	been selected, but the office is now preparing to transition all events back to pre-pandemic schedules. In 2018, the General Service Office contracted a consultant that sent 11 Request for Proposals (RFP) to hotels in New York City, Westchester County, Long Island, Connecticut, and New Jersey, and secured the current site of the Brooklyn Marriott for the 2022 and 2023 Conferences. Although a few years old, the data gathered provides a good cross-section of hotels eligible for selection. The background contains the memorandum from the General Manager with a breakdown of costs and transportation information.

A subcommittee was formed and the EDW was implemented for the 72<sup>nd</sup> General Service Conference. Aspects of the whole process that were most visible to the fellowship included the timeline advancement pushing the deadline to submit agenda requests from December 15 up to September 15, and the implementation of a Proposed Agenda Item (PAI) submission form rather than a submission letter, streamlining the processing of agenda requests and their assignment to a committee. Other initiatives of the EDW involved the coordination of communications and meetings of the trustees' and Conference committees between annual meetings and Board weekends, the creation of a scoring tool to evaluate and assign an estimate of the complexity and time-demand that each item would place on a G.S.C. committee, and the distribution of agenda items to committees that that are not receiving as many new items.</p> <p>The background is very detailed with a copy of the 2021 EDW Plan and the Year One progress report that describes the findings identified in the first year of the trial. Overall, the plan delivered the intended results, and the report goes in depth to explain the impact of the timeline advancement with the challenges and opportunities it created. It also describes the unforeseen workload and attention the project itself entailed and identifies areas of focus and questions about other processes (including background translation) to be addressed during Year Two of the trial.</p>

Fear of rejection and its ensuing pain were not to be risked, and I turned away from myself once more for the answer, this time to the drinks I had always refused before, and in alcohol I found a false courage.”</p> <p>Also included in the background is a history of the deletion of the paragraph in 2002 with excerpts from reports from the trustees’ Literature Committee explaining the reason for the deletion—which focuses on creating a similar page count between the Third Edition and Fourth Edition. If not for the edits to this story (and several others), there would be multiple blank pages at the end of the book because of how books are published.</p>
What does the Delegate need to know?	Does your group think the paragraph should be added back to the story “Freedom from Bondage” in future printings? Why or why not?

The most “attention” we get from Google searches through the Google AdWords continues to be “Find a Meeting.” Staff will continue to create new content to reach different professional categories like corrections, education, faith, HR, legal, medical, military and treatment.  It was highlighted for the Conference Committee in the Comprehensive Media Plan that the office needs the ability to continuously optimize the Google Ads campaigns based on

	standard best practices to maximize opportunities to reach suffering alcoholics. The appropriate staff members should be able to make the following updates to the campaign without waiting a year for Conference approval to ensure improved performance: Evaluate and experiment with ad targeting; A/B test ad copy and design; add/remove keywords and negative keywords; change keyword match type; test multiple landing page options; and approve/deny basic campaign suggestions provided by Google Ads.

We are the link in the chain of communication for our groups with the General Service Conference and the world of A.A. We realize the ultimate authority is a loving God as He may express Himself in our group conscience. As trusted servants, our job is to bring information to our groups in order that they can reach an informed group conscience. In passing along this group conscience, we are helping to maintain the unity and strength so vital to our fellowship. Let us, therefore, have the patience and tolerance to listen while others share, the courage to speak up when we have something to share, and the wisdom to do what is right for our group and A.A. as a whole.”</p>
What does the Delegate need to know?	Does your group think that adding a G.S.R. preamble to the pamphlet would be beneficial? Why or why not?

Historical Context; Why is it on the Agenda?	<p>The trustees’ Literature Committee received and forwarded two separate requests asking that, upon the creation of a Fifth Edition of the book <i>Alcoholics Anonymous</i>, the chapter titled “The Doctor’s Opinion” be returned to page one, as it was in the First Edition published in 1939. When the Second Edition was published, Roman numerals were printed prior to what is now page one (material prior to page one also includes the Preface and the Forewords). There is nothing in the background explaining the reasoning behind changing the page numbering in the book.</p> <p>One proposal states that most readers do not read the pages with Roman numerals. If someone is reading without guidance from another member, they might miss this section. There are links to slides included in the background with a note that in the 1995 Advisory Action it states, “The first 164 pages of the Big Book, <i>Alcoholics Anonymous</i>, the Preface, the Forewords, ‘The Doctor’s Opinion,’ ‘Doctor Bob’s Nightmare’ and the Appendices remain as is.” The other proposal says that the placement of “The Doctor’s Opinion” on page 1 of the First Edition was of paramount importance. It is noted that some members are comfortable with the memorization of current page numbers, but they</p>

	are asking for a restoration to the original page numbering to “help more newcomers have a better chance at sobriety.”
What does the Delegate need to know?	Does your group think “The Doctor’s Opinion” should be renumbered to be page 1 in future printings of the Big Book? Why or why not?

In 2019 there was a Conference Advisory action to “...develop anonymity-protected audio interviews with military professionals about their experience with A.A. as a resource for posting online.” The trustees’ Cooperation with the Professional Community/Treatment and Accessibilities Committee reviewed the progress report on audio interviews with A.A. members who are in the Armed Forces and made the following suggestions: Develop a questionnaire for audio-military interviews; Request a broad cross-section of A.A. members; Create a standard roadmap between U.S. and Canada having a unified plan; Seek interviews and seek contacts from various military branches; and Develop a project plan that will include reporting to the entire trustee committee. The subcommittee on Military Audio Interviews will continue their work and provide a progress report to the trustees’ committee at the July 2022 meeting.

Historical Context; Why is it on the Agenda?	<p>The 2018 Conference Committee on Trustees reviewed a proposal to reorganize the A.A.W.S. and General Service Boards and took no action on the proposal. Though they didn’t see a need at that time, they did request that the trustees’ Nominating committee develop procedures for a partial or complete reorganization of our corporate boards should a need arise in the future. A subcommittee was formed and procedures were drafted and brought back to the 2019 Conference, together with pertinent information provided by legal counsel.</p> <p>The 2019 Conference Committee reviewed the draft and provided suggestions for additional specificity. One of those suggestions included a revision to Article 4 of the Conference Charter, which was reviewed by the Report and Charter Committee and approved by the 2020 Conference. The 2020 Conference Committee on Trustees reviewed the revised procedures and suggested that the use of alternate trustees be considered and a revised plan be brought back to the 2021 Conference. A memo in the background from the General Manager explains that current practices and procedures would not allow for the creation of an alternate trustee, and points to how the current draft plan offers a viable solution for prompt reorganization of the Board.</p> <p>The 2021 Conference Committee on Trustees reviewed the procedures again and requested that the trustees’ Nominating Committee consider further review, with specific attention placed upon on the time frame and procedure for the selection of regional trustees. They also suggested some minor editorial changes for clarity and to reflect the updated Conference Charter. Those editorial changes can be seen in the newest draft of procedures included in the background. The trustees’ Nominating Committee did not make any substantive changes to the procedure for regional trustees, noting that ample</p>

	communication and planning would be available for areas to develop a selection procedure for regional trustees if the Conference were to call for such reorganization. In the background, other communication between the two committees during the past year indicates that further discussion among area delegates with the trustee for their region is acceptable, if desired. The purpose of those discussions would be to gain more clarity or to offer any specific suggestions for improvement to the procedures.
What does the Delegate need to know?	Does your group feel these Procedures are sufficient to guide the Fellowship through such a reorganization, if needed? Why or why not? If not, does your group have any specific suggestions for improvement?

Group Inventory, question 9 asks: “Mindful that holding office is a great responsibility not to be viewed as the outcome of a popularity contest, are we choosing our officers with care?” Their suggestion is to change it to: “Mindful that trusted service is a great responsibility not to be viewed as the outcome of a popularity contest, are we choosing our trusted servants with care?”
What does the Delegate need to know?	Note: The question on page 32 of the Spanish version of the pamphlet (SP-16) is worded differently. Does your group think that this text needs revising? Why or why not?

Historical Context; Why is it on the Agenda?	At the 2021 Conference, the Conference Committee on International Conventions/Regional Forums had a thoughtful and wide-ranging discussion regarding methods of closing the Big Meetings at the International Convention, particularly the use of the Lord's Prayer. Although the prayer is part of the history of A.A. and is widely used and supported in some areas, it could make some members feel excluded and its continued use supports the misperception of A.A. as a religious organization. The committee also discussed possible alternatives to the Lord's Prayer, including the Third Step Prayer, the Seventh Step Prayer, and A.A.'s Declaration of Unity. A survey is being created by the trustees' Committee to gather wider sharing from the Fellowship regarding the use of the Lord's Prayer at International Conventions. This survey will go out through multiple communication platforms (Box 459, A.A. Grapevine/La Viña, etc.) Implementation of the survey has been delayed to later in 2022/2023.

**Conference Committee: Int'l Conventions/Regional Forums — Item B**

Agenda Topic	<b>Discuss ways to encourage interest in Regional Forums and attract first-time attendees.</b>
Historical Context; Why is it on the Agenda?	Regional Forums are held several times a year and are a service provided by GSO staff and the General Service Board with the intent of allowing the general A.A. membership (not just people involved in General Service) to meet and interact with GSO staff and corporate Board members. This helps members put a face to their trusted servants and special workers. In order to encourage interest and attract first-time attendees, this committee discusses several ideas each year. In 2021 some ideas discussed were: using the meeting guide app to further convey Regional Forum information; using videoconferencing technology to broadcast portions of future in-person forum programs, allowing members who may not have resources or time to travel to participate; ensuring future host regions are well informed about dates, locations, programs, and ways the local membership can participate; extending outreach materials to invite the Spanish-speaking and LGBTQ communities to attend Regional Forums; conducting at least one presentation or workshop in Spanish and/or French at each Regional Forum.
What does the Delegate need to know?	Do members of your group know about Regional Forums? Are they planning to attend the Pacific Regional Forum in Salt Lake City, UT, September 16-18, 2022? What are some of the things that could attract members of your group to attend a Regional Forum?
